### Price Cutting Competition

No business for profit is immune to competition. At Wheelabrator we compete for our share of the business in the industries we serve with blast cleaning equipment, steel abrasives, vibratory finishing equipment and air pollution control equipment. In all these fields we are not alone and this competition is an ever-present threat.

This challenge is most difficult to meet.

Regardless of the reason, lost business affects you personally and the company as well, inasmuch as there are less profits to share, there are less funds for plant improvement and expansion, there are fewer opportunities for personal advancement, and employment is affected in proportion to the decline in business volume.

Therefore, whether we succeed or fail in meeting the competitive challenge depends upon how skillfully and successfully we all do our individual jobs. By paying attention to detail and adhering to the Vital Values program, each of us can do his part in keeping Wheelabrator competitive.

## W. W. Criswell Division Produces Filter Fabrics for Dustube Collectors

The heart of every Wheelabrator Dustube Collector is the fabric filter bags which trap the dust particles in the gas stream. Because every air pollution control problem varies in the particle size and amount of dust to be trapped, the temperature and chemical composition of the gas stream, plus many other variables, no one fabric is satisfactory for use in the countless industrial applications of the Dustube Collector.

Wheelabrator is unique in the air pollution control industry in that we have our own facilities for developing and fabricating the fabric filters — the W. W. Criswell Division with plants in Riverton, New Jersey and Riverside, California.


In addition to extensive manufacturing facilities, Criswell has complete chemical and physical laboratories for pursuing extensive research and development activities. It is in these areas that noteworthy achievements have been made in new and improved materials and techniques. Some of these include improved fiberglass filter fabrics, special chemical finishing of cloth to increase temperature, abrasion and fracture resistance, unique bag suspension systems, bag ribs and rings to prevent flexure and failure, etc.

Many future projects now under way include: evaluation of new fabrics, filtering of gases in excess of 800°F., and development of new weaves and

finishing techniques to improve the filtration characteristics of existing fabrics.

## Kohlmeyer Named Vice President of Sales



If your household laundry requirements are such that you can't justify or afford your own washing machine and dryer, you just go down to the corner laundromat and have your weekly laundry done for a few cents. Modern industry often finds itself in this same position with its metal cleaning and finishing requirements except that until recently there were only a few such laundromats available for this purpose.

One of our divisions, AFCO, Abrasive Finishing Co., Gardena, California, has provided such a service for a number of years in the Los Angeles area with particular emphasis upon doing shot peening for the aeronautical industry. They have recently added a Wheelabrator Rubber Deflasher for job shop deflashing of rubber moldings. In the New York and New Jersey industrial area our Reber Sandblasting Co. Division handles the requirements for industrial plants.

Utilizing all of the equipment in our demonstration facility, the center is equipped and staffed to handle shot peening, blast cleaning, vibratory finishing as well as ultrasonic finishing for any size job.

Upon arrival in Chicago, the group gathered at the New National Tap and Ballroom for a family style dinner then rode to the White Sox Stadium for the action.





### **New Safety Records Set**

The longest accumulation ever recorded of employee hours without lost time injuries has been set by the Machine Shop and Tool Crib Department for the first eight months of 1968. One-fourth million man-hours have accumulated in this department without a lost time accident.

Three other departments which also were accident-free during this period were Production Control, Inspection, and the Research, Demonstration and Lorco Laboratory. Another commendable safety record recently set by the entire manufacturing area was two accident-free months in a row.

The safety record throughout our plants is one to which we must pay continual attention. According to the National Bureau of Labor Statistics, our accident rate is below the national average for our type of industry. However, as can be noted in the chart below, some departments have already exceeded the anticipated annual accident standard set at the beginning of this year.
