
RAY STUART RETIRES . . .

AND A HAPPY ST. PADDY'S DAY TO YOU... America's adoption of Saint Patrick is almost as old as the Pilgrim's penetration of the New World.

Early Irish immigrants paid him tribute by setting aside March 17 in seventeenth century church services. Social fanfare which carried over into today's parades, dinners, and balls was just one step behind. By 1937 an Irish Society paraded down the streets of Boston, setting the precedent for the first non-religious celebrations of the day.

Although his birthplace has never been officially established, Saint Patrick has been honored as one of Ireland's own since his death on March 17, 493. As a youngster St. Patrick was taken from Scotland by marauders who sold him as a slave to an Irish chieftain. He escaped but later returned to Ireland, devoting 60 years to teaching, preaching, organizing parishes and building churches.
