LET'S TALK SKILLS . . .

Among the many skilled trades practiced in our division is that of the Patternmaker. Located in a loft area, in the middle of Plant 1, is the Foundry's Pattern Shop. Our Patternmakers — Glenn Martin and Jim Olsen — are responsible for taking a blueprint of a proposed casting and turning it into a master pattern. Although the dimensions of the casting may be a "science," the results of the Patternmaker's labor could be termed an "art."

This is a skill which requires a long period of learning. Ten thousand shop hours (five years) and a minimum of five classroom hours per week, during the five-year period, are necessary to be considered even a base patternmaker. Experience in fundamental metal and woodworking is a must, not to mention a high aptitude for math.


In nearly every cast part produced by our Foundry, Jim and Glenn were at least partly responsible for turning an idea into a reality.

Here **Jim** is in the process of creating a master pattern.































WORKING TOGETHER — THE UNITED WAY . . .

WE PAID MOST... The Tax Foundation reports that for the third year in a row Indiana received the smallest return on federal tax dollars. Indiana paid \$1.41 for every \$1 returned to state and local governments. Texas came second, paying \$1.36. Ohio came in third with \$1.31.

According to the report, Indiana was one of 23 states that "paid," i.e., sent more money to Washington than it got back in the form of grants to local and state government.

The lowest tax burden was in the District of Columbia which got \$1 federal money for only 34 cents. Mississippi had the second lowest tax burden (53 cents), while Vermont was third (56 cents).
