#### TRAGIC OR JOYOUS?

We are referring to the Christmas free which cuches fire, often at the height of the holiday celebration with hour loved ones gathered about. Christmas Teecs burn derectly because they are filled with highly combustities substances such as pitch and resion. It is best to choose a small tree, be-

larger one, Keep the tree outdoors, and don't set it up until a couple of day's befare Christmas. Place it in the rodest part of the house, away from fireplines and radiators, and don't let it block any exit. Our Liquamatte Division has solved a special problem for Allis-Caalmors Manufacturing Company, Gadsden, Alabam. They are using, one of our machines to clean round rods. Å" x 8" and Knurled on each end. These are actually the spindles which pick the cotton from the bolls. The problem presented to us was to remove scale the entire length of the rod as well as in the flutes. The production requirement was 2,000 rods per hour.

To a special Liquamatte handles the places in a "straight through" flow so that the end first fed to the machine is the end first to leave, thus overcoming the necessity of sorting after cleaning.

The individual rods are fed into the pinch rolls at one end of the machine

and are guided by hardened steel tubes held in place by WR metal discor guides. Each rod, as it moves between the plach rolls, pushes the rods shead of it on through the unit at a constant and predetermined rate.

The chain cleaned varies from "to \$\frac{1}{2}\text{h}", while the links vary from 1" to \$1" in length. The chain is degressed before Wheelabrating.

The Sangamo Electric Company, Springfield, Illinoia, is deflashing plastic parts used in the manufacture of electric meters. Our 20" x 2" WATB has eliminated hand deflacking.

One of our No. 3 Multi-Tables with four 48" tables for cleaning plow mold boards in flat and assemblies, is in operation at Plant No. 1 of the Oliver Corporation, South Bend.

The City of Bettle Creek, Michigan is using a No. 2-C Suction Blast Cabinet for cleaning water meters.

The Dalton Foundry, Warsaw, Indiana, uses a 72" Swing Table for large malicable castings for Caterpiller and Seeger refrigerators.
