Many of us even have false impressions of the salesman's work.

But in addition to technical and business skill, he must be a student of people, and human renction. In the final analysis companies never buy. ### **OUR COMPANY CONDUCTS**

A score of top personnel from the U. S. Bureau of Aeronauties, various U. S. Navol Air Stations and private industry mel here April 30 to May 4 to attend a seminar on Shot Peening. sponsored by Wheelabrator, The Diogram got underway with an address of welcome by Ernie Glbson. The various sessions were conducted by the following Wheelabrator people: Ernie Glbson, Engineer in Charge of Government Sales; John Straub, Chief Research Engineer: Harold Schulte, Supervising Design Engineer; George MrNelle, Assistant Supervising Design Engineer. The seminar consisted of lectures, demonstrations in the Company laboratories and questions and answers.

The rapid growth of the need for shot pecning during the nast few years and the tremendous stodes made in research and development have rather increased the gap between the expert and potential user of this process. It was the purpose of this seminar to help bridge that gap, thus providing a complete and detailed explanation of the shot peening technique. It was pointed out that with the use of Wheelabrator Steel Shot and michimes designed for particular applications. shot peening is a relatively inexpensive operation as compared to previous methods. The increased fatigue life of many parts has been astounding and its application has increased to the extent where it is a basic requirement for such paris.

## HOME ACCIDENTS STILL IN LEAD

Traffic accidents are shocking, but let's consider another kind. Five million disabling accidents occur each year in American homes, costing more than one bill on dollars. Home accidents are four times as frequent as those occurring on the highway, three times as many as those happening in industry, and two and a half times the number happening in public places. Yet, compared with the problem of controlling highway, public and industrial accidents, our home situation receives by far the least attention. If present trends were to continue, the number of disabling home accidents will reach 7 million by 1975.

Some new bazards will be found, but at the same time others should be less frequent. Here are trends that may be looked for in the years ahead:

- Pleable plastics will be used more and more in the home as storage containers, gradually replacing glass hordes, the number one cause of borse lacerations.
- Houses already built that will be seeing service during the next 20 years will have undergone extensive inuciur remodeling. This will be necessary to occumulate new developments in appliances, furnishings and conveniences.
- 3. New homes, conforming in design and architecture to "push butmn"

- tiving, will send seward one-story construction.
- Prefabricated and package-bailt houses will tome into use in the small-homes field, and to some extent for high-priced homes.
- Stairways and steps will be largely eliminated. Where they remain, they will be better lighted and less steps.
- Improvement in home lighting will climinate the treatherous shadow.
- 7. While wood will continue to be the basic home building material for at least arother 20 years, alum num may in time replace in: Plistics also are about to come toto greater use, both as structural and surfacing materials.
- Houses will become increasingly fireproof. City fire codes are expected to specify an increasing number of fire-resistant materials. including fureproofed wood products.
- 9. Inside the home will be mutisafor. The likehe mach willigive way to or the kinehe mach willigive way to a nummit? Fughing devices. Sharp a knives will be replaced by automotic cutting devices.
