

This company produces east steel high-pressure valve bodies and parts for exclusive use in petroleum refineries. These valves range from ½" diameter to 20" diameter and weigh up to 2300 pounds.

## Handles Big Volume

At Pacific Southern the Super Tumblast handles approximately 70 tons of work per day, with the average hourly production 8750 grands. Average loads weigh from 2400 to 3400 pounds.






# DILL PRESENTS PAPER
