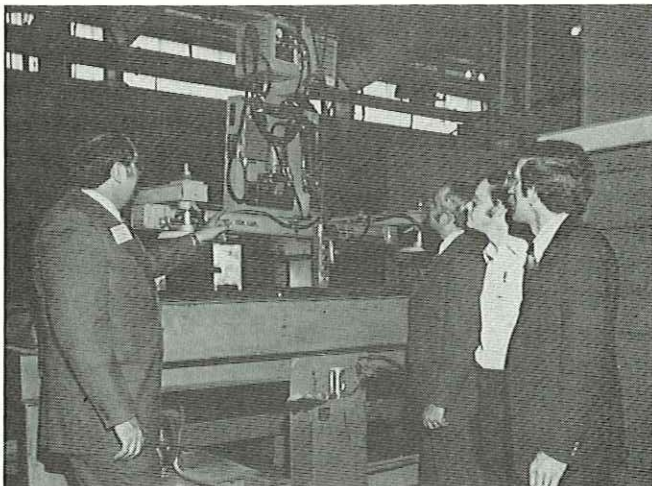

The unique design features a space-saving rotating door which revolves within the blast cabinet. Loading and unloading operations of the 3700 mm (12 ft.) work table are done at the front of the rotating table. Noteworthy, too, this machine is our first to implement the metric system.
