

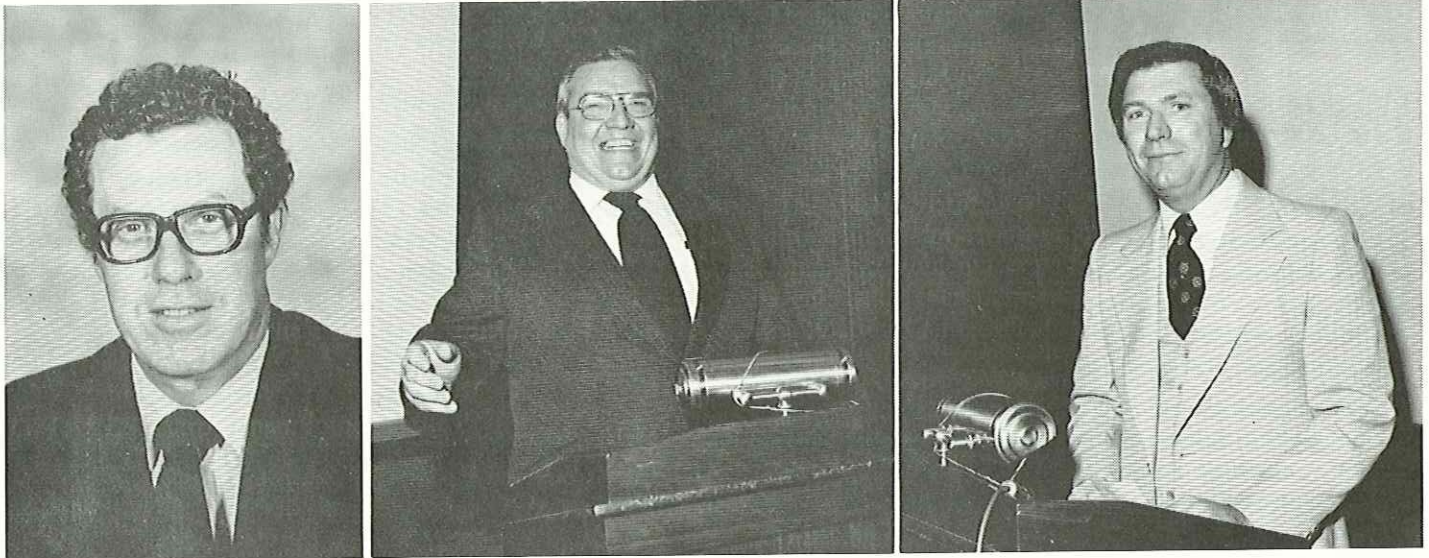

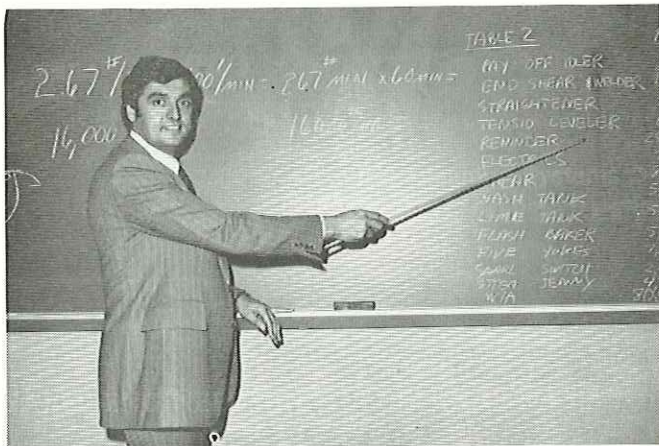
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## SALES ENGINEERS IN FOR SEMINAR . . .

**REMINDERS FROM PERSONNEL . . .** The Indiana county in which you are residing on January 1 of each year determines whether you will be required to pay a county option tax during that year.

If you have moved, or will be moving, from an Indiana county that has not adopted the county option tax into a county that has (or vice versa) anytime this year, please go to the Personnel Office in November or December to sign a new Exemption Tax Certificate.

**AND . . .** Employees who have dependent, unmarried children, (age 19 to 25) may cover them under Blue Cross-Blue Shield as overage dependents. To be covered, the child must be enrolled on a special enrollment application. To be eligible the dependent must meet all of the following qualifications: "Dependent, unmarried children to age 25 will be covered under the family plan. Such children to be eligible must be unmarried, legally residing with, and dependent on the employee for more than half their support as defined by the Internal Revenue Code of the United States, and must either qualify in the current year for dependency tax status or have been reported as a dependent on the employee's most recent federal income tax return."

Any employees desiring to enroll or to re-enroll such dependents must report to the Personnel Office each year prior to December 1. They will be required to complete a special enrollment form and attest to the dependency status of the individual. Field personnel may write to the Personnel Office requesting the special enrollment form.

**DON'T FORGET TO APPLY . . .** Any employee or child of an employee who will be eligible to enroll in college in the Fall of next year has the opportunity to apply for the Verne E. Minich "Founder" Scholarship (at Purdue University) or the Otto A. Pfaff Scholarship (at the University at Notre Dame). Application must be made before JANUARY 1. Check with our Personnel Office.
