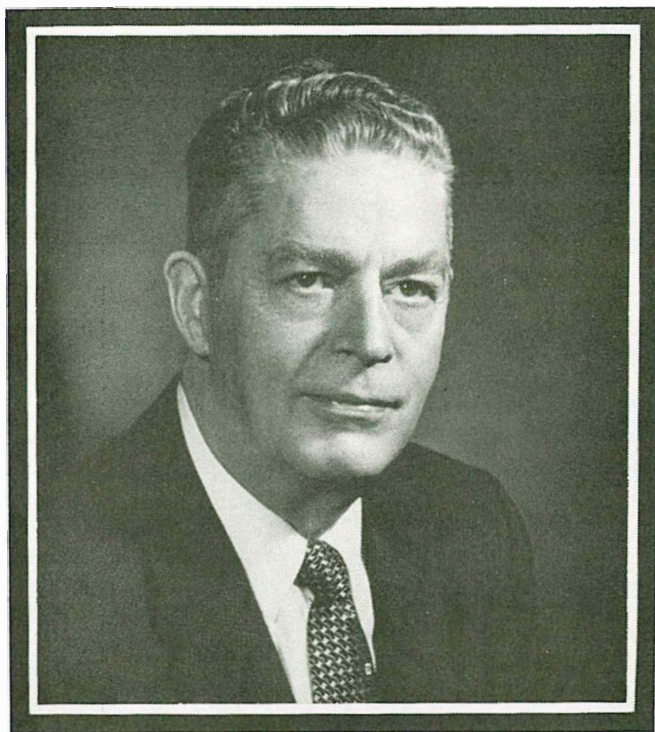

OTTO A. PFAFF, the second president of Wheelabrator Corporation, our predecessor company, died on November 5 in South Bend at the age of 80.

Joining our original company, The Sand Mixing Machine Company in 1916, Mr. Pfaff progressed through the ranks becoming President in 1941 and Chairman of the Board in 1957. He retired in 1958 after a 42 year career with the company.

In recognition of his many contributions to the firm, the annually awarded Otto A. Pfaff Scholarship to the University of Notre Dame was established.

JULIUS VANDER BRUGGHEN has retired — a half century after coming to work for Wheelabrator as a “blue-print boy.”

Julius took a few minutes on his last day at work to think back half a century (but only a few minutes — he still had a job he wanted to finish).

“My father took me out of school to help him build our house — it’s the same house I live in now — and when we finished I asked him if I could go back to school. But he said times were a bit tough and I’d better get a job. My sister (Odelia Schaut, who retired in 1974 after 48 years with Wheelabrator) was already working here, so I came down and asked if I could have a job. They said yes. I said when do I start? They said right now. So I started right in that very moment.” Julius chuckled. “And I’ve been here ever since — till today.”

Julius, a self-taught engineer, was involved in the engineering of sandcutters, dust collectors and, from the very first, the Company’s Tumblast machines. He was principally responsible for the engineering drawings in development of rubber deflashing equipment.

Julius was honored by his fellow workers at a reception hosted by the Julianna Club on his anniversary date. The following week a testimonial dinner was held at the Morris Park Country Club for invited guests. (See centerfold for a photo recording of the events.)

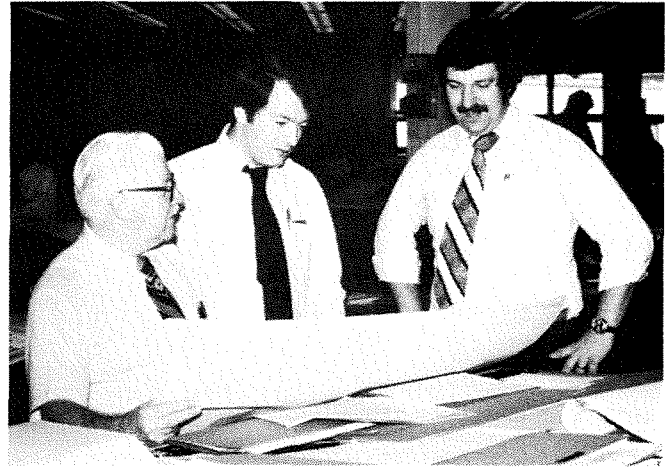
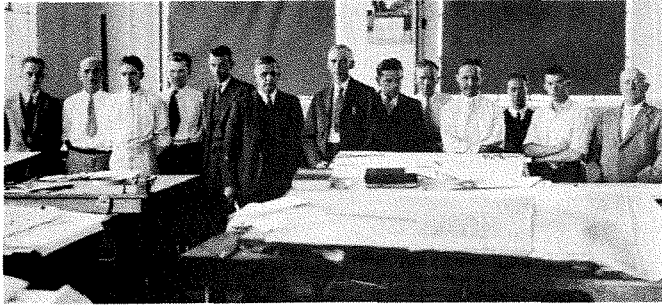
