NOTICE TO ALL EMPLOYEES

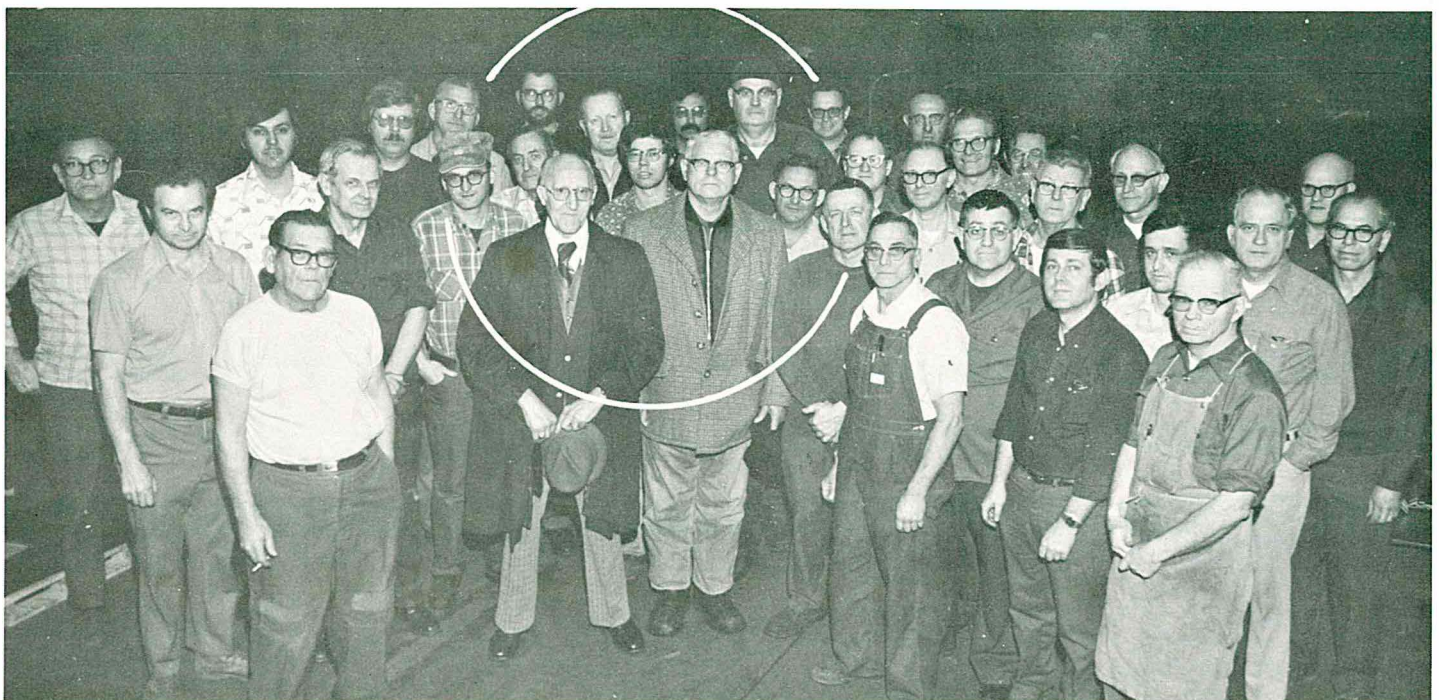
It has come to our attention that employees of MCSD are parking on Byrkit Street in front of the office portion of our building.

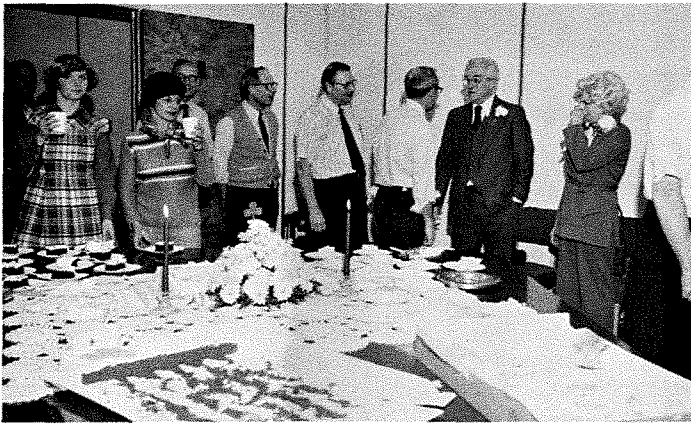

McNEILE HONORED . . .



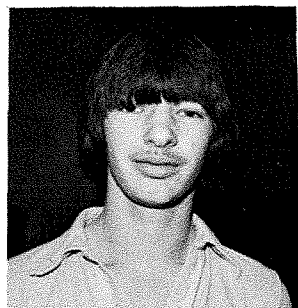
