WFI SCHOLARSHIP WINNERS ANNOUNCED ... Joyce Kovach and James A. Nowinski have been named the 1979 recipients of the two university scholarships annually awarded by our division.

A 1979 graduate of Marian High School, Jim is the son of Mr. & Mrs. John B. Nowinski, South Bend. Joyce, the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Ladd J. Kovach, Mishawaka, is a 1979 graduate of LaSalle High School.

Joyce, the recipient of the Verne E. Minich "Founders" Scholarship — named after Wheelabrator's founder and first president — plans to study Public Relations at Purdue University.

Jim plans to pursue a career in Chemical Engineering and will attend the University of Notre Dame as the recipient of the Otto A. Pfaff Scholarship. (This award is named after the company's second president.)

At Marian High School, Jim ranked second scholastically and was named salutatorian of his graduating class. A member of the National Honor Society, he played piano in the school's jazz band. He has also served as a junior Kiwanian and has been a South Bend Tribune honor carrier for over five years.

Joyce ranked scholastically in the top half of her class at LaSalle where she was involved in numerous extra-curricular activities, including participation in the jazz, concert and marching bands. She has been the recipient of fifteen gold and three silver medals in the District Music Contests during her high school career and has lettered in volleyball and track.

The grants have a potential value of \$6,000. Selection of the winners rests solely in the hands of the respective universities and the awards are based on the student's ability to meet college requirements, scholastic record, financial need, citizenship and moral character. First preference is given to children of our employees.


