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


ENGINEERING CO-OP STUDENT — A WINNER!

SWISS GNP LEADS WORLD... Switzerland has overtaken Kuwait as the world's richest nation, based on gross national product per inhabitant, the Union Bank of Switzerland reported recently. The U.S. ranked eighth. In 1978 the Union Bank says, national income in Switzerland amounted to \$13,853 per inhabitant, a 39 per cent increase over 1977.

Kuwait, in second place, had a per person GNP of \$13,000. Denmark was third with \$10,948. Fourth was Sweden (\$10,440) and West Germany was fifth (\$10,415). The U.S. figure was \$9,646, which was also less than Belgium (\$9,939) and Norway (\$9,849). Rounding out the top ten were the Netherlands (\$9,367) and Saudi Arabia (\$9,330).
