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IN OBSERVANCE OF LABOR DAY, all departments will be closed Friday, August 29, through Monday, September 1.

And, for your info, may we offer the following:

Labor Day — which is anything but a day of labor except for those thousands trying to buck the homebound traffic — ranks with the Fourth of July, Thanksgiving, and Christmas as one of the most generally observed holidays. Traditionally, it is considered the final day of summer vacation.

Labor Day's celebration, on the first Monday in September, dates back to 1882. The idea of having a national holiday "representative of the industrial spirit, the great vital force of the nation," was suggested by Peter J. McGuire, a New York union official.

In 1884 the American Federation of Labor voted to make national what had been purely an Empire State celebration, and ten years later it was being observed as a legal holiday in 30 states.

Today, Labor Day is a legal public holiday in every state and in Canada.

Thanks to your support of United Way, the Alcoholism Council was able to screen and refer 327 alcoholics and their families into counseling programs in 1979.


Also in 1979, the Council's Labor Management Program assisted 66 new clients having job related problems, as well as checking the progress of 49 previous clients.
